	English	Maths
Monday	<p>Watch this video about the difference between fiction (story) books and non-fiction (information) books https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=7RRPqkPhRI8. Have a look through your books at home. Can you find a non-fiction book? Maybe you have a recipe book at home.</p> <p>Non-fiction books sometimes have instructions telling us how to do something e.g. bake a cake, complete a craft activity or brush our teeth.</p> <p>Instructions use imperative verbs (bossy words e.g. draw, cut, put) to tell us what to do.</p> <p>Have a look through your non-fiction books and make a list of all the imperative verbs you can find. If you have an analogue clock or watch in your house, look at it regularly throughout the day. Tuesday	<p>When we follow instructions, we need to perform each step in the correct order, otherwise we could end up getting a little confused! Instructions often use time words to help us decide which order things should be done in.</p> <p>Have a think about 5 things you do in the morning. They may include:</p> <p><i>Get out of bed.</i></p> <p><i>Brush my teeth.</i></p> <p><i>Wash my face.</i></p>	<p>When we learn about time we also think about days of the week and months of the year. Have a go at writing the days of the week in order. Can you write them in order starting with today?</p> <p>Practise our days of the week song</p> <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=spi77By9-iA&t=7s</p> <p>Can you also order the months of the year; it can be a bit trickier. 	<p><i>Eat my breakfast.</i> <i>Get dressed.</i></p> <p>Now decide which order these are done in (everyone may do them differently) and think of time words: first, then, next, finally, before, after etc.</p> <p>Write into sentences using time words e.g. <i>I get out of bed before I wash my face. I eat my breakfast after I get dressed.</i></p>	<p>Once you have had a practise, have a go at the My Maths activity called 'Talking about time'.</p>
Wednesday	<p>Conjunctions are joining words. We use conjunctions to join two sentences together. The words and, but and because can be used to add extra detail to your sentences.</p> <p><i>I am going to the shops and I am going to buy some milk.</i></p> <p>I would like some ice-cream but I did not eat all of my dinner.</p> <p>I love your skirt because it is so colourful.</p> <p>Have a go at writing a sentence of your own using each of the conjunctions.</p> <p>Play this game to practise what you have learnt. https://www.turtlediary.com/game/complete-the-sentences-with-the-correct-conjunction.html</p>	<p>In Maths we often use the time words: earlier, later, quicker, slower. Can you think of some times that you might use these words?</p> <p><i>Mrs Dammery had her dinner earlier than her daughter.</i></p> <p><i>The hare was quicker than the tortoise.</i></p> <p>Have a go at the My Maths activity called 'Comparing time 1'.</p>

Thursday	<p>Play this game to practise your spelling http://www.ictgames.com/littleBirdSpelling/</p> <p>Chose Year 1 and then select any of the bird boxes to practise.</p> <p>You could put some of the words into sentences, on paper, if you would like to.</p>	<p>Have a go at making your own analogue clock. You could make it out of card or paper, whatever you have at home. If you have any split pins or paperclips, you could have a go at making the hands move. Friday	<p>In phonics this week we would have been looking at different ways to make the long i sound such as 'y' as in sky, 'igh' as in light and 'ie' as in tie.</p> <p>Watch this alphablocks video</p> <p>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=-IcE8bEdvHI&list=PL9KzDZeZLpPPbfTAWWy1SoC2YsCtjRF_2</p> <p>Play buried treasure with the 'igh' (phase 3) and 'ie' (phase 5) graphemes</p> <p>https://new.phonicsplay.co.uk/resources/phase/2/buried-treasure</p>	<p>Practise counting in multiples of 2, 5 or 10. Focus on one multiple at a time and see how fluently you can count before moving on the next. 10s is usually the easiest to start with.</p> <p>You can use this online 100 square to help</p> <p>https://www.primarygames.co.uk/pg2/splat/splatsq100.html</p> <p>Or print up a 100 square that you can colour in from twinkl</p> <p>https://www.twinkl.co.uk/search</p>
