

# History of Wimbledon

Wimbledon is the world's oldest tennis tournament and many consider it to be the most prestigious.

Since 1877, it has been held at the All England Club in Wimbledon, London.

It is one of the four Grand Slam tennis tournaments (Majors) alongside the US Open, the Australian Open and the French Open.

Wimbledon is the only Major still played on traditional grass, the game's original surface, which gave the game its original name of "lawn tennis".





# Trophies and Prize Money

The Gentlemen's Singles champion receives a silver gilt cup which bears the inscription: "All England Lawn Tennis Club Single Handed Championship of the World".

The Ladies' Singles champion is awarded a sterling silver salver called The Venus Rosewater Dish.

The winners don't keep these actual trophies but take a smaller replica. In 2017, the Gentlemen's and Ladies' Singles Champions were awarded £2.2 million pounds each.

# Wimbledon Schedule

Wimbledon takes place in early July and lasts for 14 days.

Traditionally, there are no matches on the "Middle Sunday", which is a rest day. However, due to rain, play has taken place on this day on a few occasions.

## **Martina Navratilova**

She won 18 Grand Slam singles titles, won a record nine Wimbledon singles titles and a record 167 singles titles in total between 1978 and 1990.

## Steffi Graf

She won seven Wimbledon singles titles between 1988 and 1996. Her greatest achievement came in 1988 when she won all four Grand Slam titles and Olympic gold.

## Serena Williams

Serena has won seven Wimbledon singles titles. She has also won each of the other Grand Slam tournaments at least three times!

## Venus Williams

She has won a total of five Wimbledon singles titles and played against her sister Serena in the final.

# Wimbledon Female Champions



**Billie Jean King**

The former world number one won a total of six Wimbledon titles and 39 Grand Slam titles in her career between 1966 and 1975.

# Wimbledon Male Champions



**Sir Andy Murray**

In 2013, Murray won the men's singles title. He was the first British singles winner since 1977 and the first male winner since 1936! He won the title again in 2016.

## Roger Federer

Federer has won seven men's singles titles at Wimbledon. He won five in a row between 2003 and 2007, a period where he totally dominated grass-court tennis. Roger has also won all of the other Grand Slam tournaments.

He won seven singles titles at Wimbledon, all between 1993 and 2000.

## Boris Becker

Becker won his first Wimbledon title aged just 17 in 1985. Becker went onto win a total of three men's singles titles.

**Novak Djokovic**

At Wimbledon, Novak has taken three men's single titles in 2011, 2014 and 2015.

# More Facts and Figures

At Wimbledon, Novak has taken three men's single titles in 2011, 2014 and 2015.

An average of 86,000 ice creams are sold during the championships and 28,000kg of strawberries are consumed.

The fastest serve at the tournament was recorded in 2010, travelling at 148mph!

A hawk called Rufus flies around the grounds to deter local pigeons.

## Tickets

The majority of centre court tickets are made available by a public ballot where applicants are selected at random by a computer. Fans without tickets can queue up overnight to get seats on match day.



