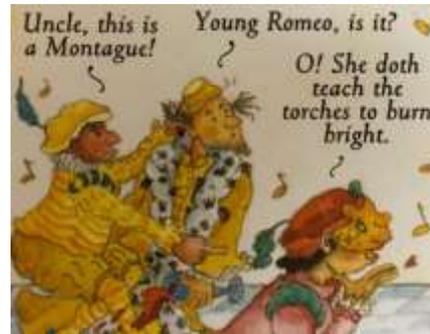

Romeo persuaded a man called Friar Laurence to lead their wedding. They had to keep their wedding a secret because their families were enemies.



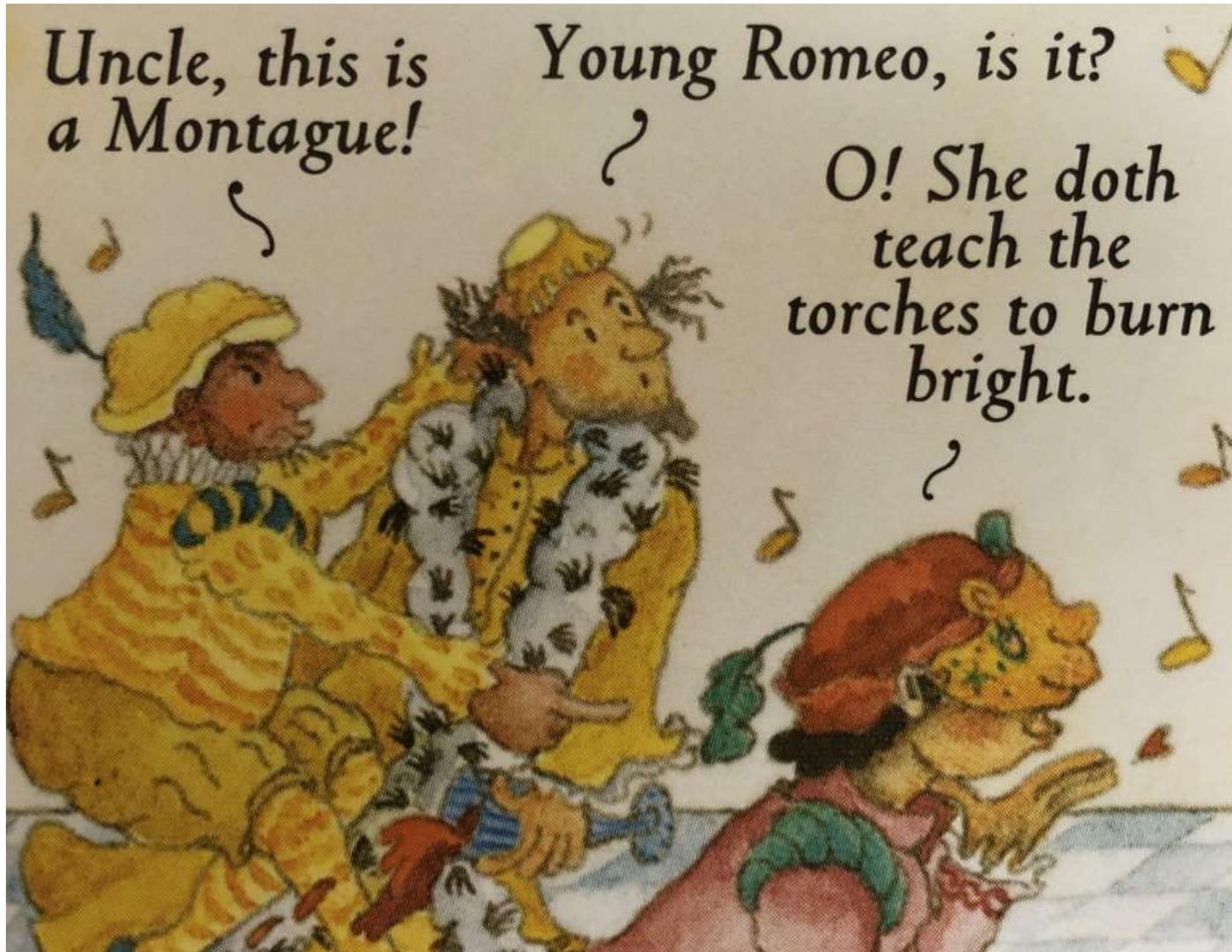
